

A field trip to a museum should be a <u>fun and educational experience</u>. One of the ways to ensure a positive experience is to practice <u>proper museum etiquette</u>:

1. Artifacts and art on display are **not to be touched.**

2. There is **no climbing or sitting on artifacts**, both <u>for the visitor's safety and</u> for <u>the protection of the artifacts</u>.

3. Do not linger around or inside **the Museum Store**. <u>Up to 20 students at a time</u> <u>may enter the store</u>, and then rotate out to make room for others. Chaperones must accompany students in the store.

4. The group leader and chaperones are responsible for **keeping their students together and for maintaining proper behavior.** We recommend at least one (1) <u>chaperone for every ten (10) students.</u>

5. It is acceptable to talk quietly; however, **shouting is unacceptable.** Many Museum guests are military veterans who find their visit to be an emotional experience. Please respect other Museum visitors at all times.

6. Students are **not permitted to run up and down the stairs** or play on the elevators; depending on the size of the groups, <u>some groups are asked not to go</u> <u>on the stairs during their visit.</u>

7. **No food, drink, or gum** is allowed in the Museum galleries. If students bring their own bag lunches, these must be eaten outside the Museum. <u>The Devil Dog</u> <u>Diner accommodates student groups with prior reservation.</u>

8. **Cameras are permitted**, but flash photography is restricted in some areas of the Museum.

9. Backpacks, large purses, and similar items should be left on the bus.

Encourage your students to be <u>engaged and respectful visitors and to enjoy</u> the special educational experience the National Museum of the Marine Corps has to offer!
